## Journey to Magnet Status

Tursing at Swedish Covenant Hospital has been on the Journey toward Magnet Recognition since 2007. It has been an exciting journey; one in which I hope never ends, but grows and takes on new directions.

As we prepare for the recognition this summer, we are in the process of "writing our story," a story that exemplifies the Fourteen Forces of Magnetism. These forces include standards which focus on Nursing Leadership, Professional Models of Care, Quality Improvement and Professional Development.

Creating an environment which supports and recognizes Professional Development has been a high priority over the past year. We have recently revised our Clinical Ladder program. This program recognizes nurses for their years of experience, their personal development, peer mentoring, and their contributions to the community in which they serve. Becoming nationally board certified in the area of their nursing specialty has become integral to the staff nurse's progression within this Clinical Ladder program.

There are so many benefits for encouraging our staff to become nationally board certified, including:
Gives nurses recognition among their peers and indicates that the nurse has a certain level of specialty knowledge.
Healthcare consumers understand the term "board certified" and come to expect it

from their healthcare providers.

An increasing number of hospitals and facilities are using certification along with education and continued learning as criteria for advancement or reward.

Personally, I understand what it takes to become certified. Nurses are required to have hands-on experience in their specialty typically for 2 years. There is a significant body of information which must be mastered and a written test taken to validate this learning. This requires personal commitment and often time and money away from one's family.

Supporting our nurses in this process, through tuition and certification reimbursement has helped to grow our number of board certified nurses. Two years ago we had approximately 60 nurses certified; today we have more than 120 nurses. To name a few, specialties included are Medical/Surgical, Critical Care, Oncology, Rehabilitation, Surgery, and Neonatal.

This year's 2009 Gala will honor nurses of yesterday, today and tomorrow. Most importantly it will recognize the Swedish Covenant Hospital School of Nursing Alumni. I am so pleased and honored that proceeds from this year's Gala are dedicated to nursing at Swedish Covenant Hospital and their Journey towards Magnet and Professional Development.

This wonderful event will help to support bringing the *Best of the Best to the Bedside*.

## The Healing Comfort of Food

Swedish Covenant Hospital is located in one of the most diverse communities in the country. So it only makes sense to provide ethnic foods for our patients, like they eat at home. Our patient food services manager, Maria Simmons, talks about the award-winning program.

#### How did the international menu begin?

"We've had an international menu for over 10 years, including Korean, Hispanic, and Indian/Muslim cuisine. But the food was still Americanized. One day, our Korean interpreter told me that patients appreciated our efforts, but the food didn't taste like home. So she started working with us to prepare recipes and write our menu."

"Her mother and aunt came over to taste the food and make sure each recipe was accurate. Now our Korean menu has items like seaweed soup and Korean BBQ beef—all made from scratch."

"Not long after that, our Hispanic nurse liaison came to me and said she and other Hispanic-Latin employees were willing to help us develop an authentic Hispanic-Latin menu. So we went through the same process. Now we have recipes from Mexico, Equador, the Dominican Republic, Cuba, and Puerto Rico."



#### Do you find that it's helped patients?

"Absolutely. We needed an authentic menu to help patients get better. In fact, the Korean culture believes that after giving birth, the body should be replenished with iron. Seaweed has a lot of iron. So it's traditional to eat seaweed soup after giving birth. Patients are happy to be able to carry on their traditions here."
